 The team is empowered and expected to express views and give suggestions for the improvement of the systems being followed by the College.

## 3. Methodology

At the meeting (held on date 28 July 2020) with the Principal, Coordinator and Members IQAC, Coordinator and Members Academic Audit Committee, a presentation was made by the Principal which gave a general and broad profile of the facilities and activities of the College. The new facilities added and the other facilities in the process of being developed also found mention. The Audit team began their visit on Date- 29 July 2020 and spent few more days at the College to visit the various departments and facilities, for brief interactions with the faculty of each department, the students of the various departments and the support staff. Visits to the laboratories, Computer facilities, the Library and some of the other facilities of the College were accommodated in the schedule arranged by the College to enable the Audit Committee to acquire relevant firsthand information. Based on the information/data gathered from the available documents and the interactions afforded with the different components of the institution, the Audit Committee has made a sincere endeavor to put forward certain views, observations and recommendations in the body of this report with expectations that these recommendations, when implemented, will best serve the interest of the College as intended.

#### 4. Brief Profile of the College

The college session started in 1964 with B.A. first year classes, and within a short span of time the college made substantial progress. Swami Shukdevanand Ji felt the need of good teachers for smooth functioning of the education system and with his constant efforts B.Ed classes were started in 1965 in the college. In the same year B.Sc. classes were also added to the institution. In 1982, the efforts of the new management committee actualized with the addition of B.Com. courses in 1985. With the constant efforts of the present President Shri Swami Chinmayanand Saraswati Ji and other dignitaries, the college got

permission from the government to run M.Ed. and M.Com. courses. Shri Swami Shukdevanand auditorium, seminar hall and educational techniques and psychological laboratory were constructed under the directions of Swami Chinmayanand Saraswati and determined efforts of the secretary Dr Ravi Mohan, which were inaugurated by the then Governor Acharya Shri Vishnukant Shastri. A completely new look was given to the library and reading room in 2003, when it was constructed with all the facilities. Various lecture halls, lecture theatres, and indoor stadium were built in the year 2004 and were inaugurated on February 26, 2006. Administrative building of the college was renovated in 2004-2005. The college got the approval for botany and zoology subjects from the university and started its classes from 2006-2007. Staff room for arts and commerce faculties, 14 lecture halls on the second floor and other important halls were constructed in 2007-2008. PGDCA and BCA classes were started from July 2008. New laboratories for Chemistry, Zoology and Botany have been constructed and other lecture halls are under construction. Beautification work for the college remains constantly under progress. In the year 2009, BBA Program was commenced. Besides, B. Com (Finance) and B.Com. (Hons.) programs ware also started in the year 2013. After two years in 2015, seven postgraduate courses in Arts streams and Five Postgraduate courses in Science stream were launched. In the year 2016, one more self-financed unite of B.Ed. was started in the college.

## **Reaching Out**

The College encourages student participation in conferences, seminars and cultural activities of diverse array throughout the year and also motivates students to participate voluntarily in social Programmes. The NSS, NCC and Sports department have distinguished themselves through participation at various levels.



# 5.5. Curricular Aspects

The college has introduced 22UG programmes, and 14 PG programmes which shows the commitment of the institution to provide maximum knowledge in the specialized areas which will enable them to develop skills and competency.

#### Strength

- Thrust of the curriculum is in promoting value-based education, women empower- ment, gender sensitization, skill development, competency in communication skill, personality development, and conscientizing the students about environment protection. Special thrust is on job-oriented courses.
- The College campus is Manual admission procedures, student attendance, staff and students' profile, AQAR, evaluation, feedback, results, and campus placements.
- Initiated B.Voc in Cloud Computing and Information Security management
- Orientation courses are offered to teachers, students and non-teaching staff to impart the Vision and Mission of the Institution.
- All the UG and PG projects have a research component.

#### Weakness

- Restricted autonomous status allows only limited freedom in curriculum design. The University not allows to change in the existing syllabi. So, the institution cannot design and develop courses in the aided stream which would promote active learning and active research in higher education scenario.
- Lack of academic flexibility in the curriculum.






- More Interdisciplinary courses need to be introduced.

## 5.6. Teaching Learning and Evaluation

The institution is dedicated in supplying great educational excellence as well as human excellence. The educational audit confirms that quality is inextricable to educating and learning. The school in the aided and the self-financing quarter notwithstanding of having many challenges is extremely dedicated in contributing most to their students.

Teaching and getting to know are the most important focus of the educational management. All the departments preserve an educational diagram which is properly monitored by way of the HODs. Another brilliant characteristic of the instructing gaining knowledge of environment is the private relationship and bond that exist between the instructors and the students. The high learners and the slow newcomers are identified at the beginning of the tutorial year. All the departments have built-in an interactive teaching mastering methodology to hold quality. There is vast evidence displaying that the non-stop evaluation helps student learning. Traditional checking out strategies are combined with innovative techniques to make the mastering ride unique. The instructors grant preparation for assignments and seminars. The attendance is On- Line, cautiously monitored and remains free from manipulations. The educational techniques to a positive extent furnish the students to think analytically, to apprehend the premise of the study and communicate confidently. Performance in each path of study is evaluated primarily based on:

- 1. Continuous Internal Assessment throughout the semester, which is centrally monitored.
- 2. Final examination at the end of the semester.





The assessment pattern consists of the decision of weightages for one-of-a-kind cognitive ranges for all tests. The assessment pattern is communicated to all the students at the commencing of the semester. The audit indicates the major subject of the organization is improving the first-rate of getting to know which also includes an evaluation to what extent the college students master the content of the course. Mentoring and tutoring are properly monitored and documented. Remedial teaching is furnished for vulnerable students.

The administration has taken exclusive care to inculcate right values among students and has entrusted the duty to a core committee of teachers. The classification instructors ensure that fee schooling is furnished on a weekly basis in an interactive manner. This is a fundamental section of the curriculum.

- PG students mainly come from outside and hence face difficulty in coping at the beginning. But later they get adjusted.



- The department is running fine, and is receiving full support from the authority.
- Upstairs canteen hours should be extended
  - There is more rigidity in functioning. The teachers have too much work pressure from examination duties, hence there is no scope of personal research.
- Orientation programmes may be organized for students after +2 examinations.
- The department has a lot of space for different activities.
- There is a well-equipped Seminar Room, Conference Room, Yoga Room and Counselling Room.
- There are laboratories for Physical Science, Life Science.
- There are sufficient teachers.
- The library of the Department of Education is modern and well-equipped with reading and reference materials.
- There is sufficient electronic equipment, though more computers may be necessary.

#### 5.9. Support Staff

- The support staffs are generally very happy with the College Administration.
